Demo on turning a Dibble by Les Black

Les gave a great demo on using the skew. The skew is a wonderful tool BUT it takes practice to become proficient with it. Les showed the different cut that can be made with the skew, like a planing cut, right and left hand shear cutting, rolling a bead, and creating V cuts among others. Les also showed how to lay out the design with a story stick. And finally finished a Dibble.
